This is the first issue of our new paper. After deciding on a name, we discovered that the name is not exactly new, as in the time of World War II Connecticut Grangers sold enough War Bonds to pay for a plane so the War Department named a Flying Fortress the Connecticut Granger.

This paper was started in Farmill River Grange last March when the Lecturer made the suggestion that we investigate to try to start one. The Grange thought it a good idea and appointed a committee of two, George Arundell and Mrs. Maud M. Haines, now Master and Lecturer respectively. They met with State Master, State Lecturer and State Publicity Chairman and discussed this at great length. The next step was to contact printers for prices; after this came a meeting with the State Executive Committee and other State Officials in Glastonbury. The original committee after this lengthy meeting when the decision was made that if 2,000 people would subscribe to this, we would be able to start the paper. The original committee knew this meant work and so they traveled 3,764 miles and spoke to 2,994 people at 12 Pomona meetings and 28 subordinate meetings. This was done in 6 weeks at 6 meetings per week and sometimes 7.

The committee paid the expenses themselves but feel well repaid to be able to see this paper in print.

Then came the forming of the Conn. Granger Inc. with election of officers. This was followed by signing a contract with a printer and gathering the news. We are very pleased with the contacts made.

The committee hopes you will enjoy reading the paper as much as we enjoy writing it.
