HELP WANTED

The State Board of Trustees for the Connecticut State Grange youth camp located in Winchester has sent appeals to each Grange asking for work parties to come to the annual Camp Cleanup, April 23 and 24.

Mrs. Roger Merrill, Watertown, chairman of the board states that "we are asking for help to clean up cabins, shore front, dining hall and recreation grounds because we are now operating as a member of the American Camping Association which requires the best camp standards possible.

"We are hoping to get the usual good turn-out on the 23rd which will be the climax of Grange Week. For those Granges who will be attending the Youth Coronation Ball with their delegates in Cheshire that weekend, we have reserved May 7-8 for camp cleanup."

Four men of the board will each serve a turn as work superintendent as follows: On April 23 Robert Haller of Wallingford; April 24 Anton Grocki, Farmington; May 7 Arnold Woodworth, Abington; and May 8 Edward Babbitt, Norwich.

Mrs. Merrill said this year Camp Trustees Ervin Goodwin, New Hartford, Miss Cora Meservey, Sharon and Mrs. Joseph Bell, Southington will keep the fires hot for free coffee while the Grangers begin coming in from all sections of the state with their trucks, rakes, shovels and picnic baskets. She compared the event to the old neighborly barn raising where the whole town would come together to build. "The Grange is still the best do-it-yourself family organization around." she pointed out. "and its been working shoulder to shoulder since 1867."

In the COMMUNITY PROGRESS PROGRAM as of March 31 '66 Connecticut and Delaware take the lead. The National Grange Song Writing Contest is open to all Subordinate Grange members. The objective of this contest is to promote Grange songs, and to select an appropriate song for the Centennial of the National Grange. There are two classes -(a) original words and music and (b) original words set to a familiar tune. Entries in each class will be judged, and the top ten from each year's contest will be automatically entered for the finals of the Centennial Song Writing contest. Each of the top ten entrants, as determined by the judges, will be notified that his entry is in the top ten, but not exact rating and each entrant, whose song is selected for final competition will receive a certificate from National Grange. On the State level, all songs must be in the hands of the State Lecturer by September 30th and include the name and complete address, plus name of Subordinate Grange. ALL entries will be sent to National Grange for judging.






