In the State of Connecticut, there are nearly 60 communities with Grange chapters.

Grange membership is non-exclusive. Members are not limited by age, gender, culture, race or faith. 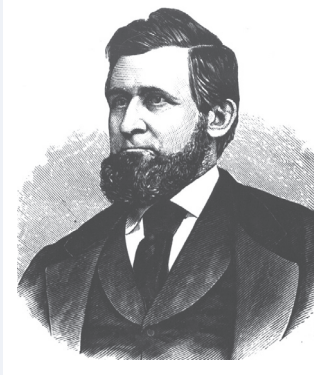
